
AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES FACTS

- An invasive aquatic plant called Eurasian Milfoil is able to clone itself when parts break off! That is how it spreads so quickly.
- Goldfish find the water conditions of the Okanagan perfect. NEVER release pets into the wild. Remember: "Don't let it loose".
- Female Zebra Mussels, Quagga Mussels, and Invasive Clams can produce up to **ONE MILLION** eggs in a single year!
- These eggs quickly develop into microscopic larvae called veligers (vel-E-jers). They are smaller than the period at the end of this sentence.
- Quagga Mussels are named after an extinct species of Zebra.
- Zebra and Quagga Mussels can filter 1 litre of water per day.
- Zebra and Quagga Mussels can live without food for **ONE YEAR!**



REVIEW

An **ADJECTIVE** describes something or somebody. Lumpy, soft, brave, messy, and short are adjectives.

A VERB is an action word. Run, pitch, jump, and swim are verbs. When a verb is PAST TENSE the words become ran, pitched, jumped and swam.

A **NOUN** is the name of a person, place, or thing. Sidewalk, umbrella, toy, bathtub, and nose are nouns.


An **ADVERB** tells us how something is done. It modifies a verb and usually ends in "ly". Modestly, greedily, and carefully are adverbs.

A **PLACE** is any kind of place. A country (Canada), a city (Penticton), or a room (bathroom, kitchen).

An **EXCLAMATION** is any sort of funny sound, gasp, grunt, or outcry. Wow!, Ouch!, Ick!, and Gadzooks! are exclamations.


A **PLURAL** means "more than one". For example, the plural form of "door" is "doors".





Ruin outdoor fun. When Zebra Mussels and Quagga mussels die, their sharp shells wash up on our beaches. People can cut their feet if they step on them! They also grow all over dock ladders, and can even clog boat motors.

Unwanted. Invasive mussels (and other invasive species) are bullies that can reproduce and grow quickly. They push native animals and plants out of their natural habitats, and can even drive them to extinction. They can also clog the pipes that we use to collect drinking water.

No natural enemies. There are no animals in BC that eat invasive mussels. This means there is nothing that can keep them under control if they get here. If they ever arrive, they are here forever.

WHAT ARE INVASIVE SELESOM


Invasive mussels are **non-native** and come from other places in the world. Zebra Mussels and Quagga Mussels were introduced from Eastern Europe and Asia.

Zebra and Quagga Mussels are small. Adult mussels have a pair of triangular shells connected by an elastic hinge. The shells are usually brown with stripes, like a zebra.

Zebra and Quagga Mussels can grow hairy strings called byssal threads that help them attach to anything in the water-boats, docks, anchors, rocks, and even our native mussels!





Average size = 3cm



Maximum size = 5cm




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
